


This year reminded us just how powerful community can be.

At a time when the affordable housing crisis continues to deepen—and when shifts at the federal level have created uncertainty, delays, and increased pressure on local housing systems—Greater Springfield Habitat for Humanity chose to lean in, not pull back. Your generosity allowed us to bridge funding gaps, navigate reimbursable grants, and continue building even when timelines stretched and costs increased. Your support helped turn challenges into opportunities and ensured that families were not left waiting for stability.

The lessons learned this year—about adaptability, collaboration, and the strength of local leadership—are shaping a stronger, more resilient GSHFH. With our community beside us, we are poised to increase affordable housing production and continue building neighborhoods where families can put down roots and thrive.





FY 2025 Financial Highlights




2025 Sources of Revenue

As president of the Board, I am proud to share Greater Springfield Habitat for Humanity's (GSHFH) annual report—both a reflection on the lives changed over the past year and a statement of our shared commitment to the work ahead. Together, we continue to transform lives by strengthening families, fostering stability, and building community through access to safe, affordable housing.

This past year, our collective impact was both meaningful and measurable. With the help of 220 volunteers, donors, and partners, GSHFH built two new homes, completed four critical home repairs, and served families throughout Greater Springfield. More than 2,400 volunteer hours were invested in strengthening neighborhoods, improving safety, and creating pathways to long-term stability for our neighbors.

Yet our impact extends far beyond the numbers. It is seen in families building equity and independence, in seniors remaining safely in the homes they cherish, in veterans gaining accessibility and dignity, and in communities coming together around a shared belief that everyone deserves a decent place to live. Expanding Affordable Housing Capacity

We will increase new home builds and home preservation projects to reach more underserved families, while advancing readiness for additional builds across Springfield, Holyoke, and neighboring communities.

Strengthening Homeowner Support Services

We will enhance support for partner families transitioning into homeownership through financial literacy education, post-purchase guidance, and expanded programs for seniors and veterans, including accessibility upgrades and specialized housing solutions.

Growing Community Partnerships

We will deepen collaborations with local businesses, civic organizations, and municipal partners, and launch targeted initiatives with workforce development and youth-focused organizations.

Volunteer Engagement and Inclusion

We will recruit and retain volunteers through year-round opportunities and meaningful roles, fostering inclusive experiences that reflect the diversity of the communities we serve.

Board and Organizational Development

We will continue to strengthen governance and leadership to ensure strong oversight, strategic growth, and long-term accountability.

Your continued partnership is essential to this mission. Together, we are not just building houses—we are building homes, strengthening families, and creating pathways and opportunities for generations to come.

Greater Springfield Habitat for Humanity (GSHFH) staffers, board members, volunteers, city officials, and family friends celebrated the completion of construction at 1688 Dwight St on June 1. More than 35 people attended the event in the backyard of the two-story home.

"This house represents stability for us," said Driss. "It will allow us to focus on raising our children and helping them achieve their goals, so they can grow and contribute positively to society."

Construction began in summer 2024. This project was made possible by sponsorships and donations from James Hardie, Key Bank, the Davis Family Foundation, RJL Contracting, Episcopal Diocese of Western Massachusetts, Community Foundation of Western Massachusetts, and Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church in Springfield, which let Habitat use its parking lot. It's across the street from the new home.

"We can't do this on our own and it's always so gratifying to see the amount of people who come out and are a part of this," said Aimee Giroux, GSHFH executive director.

Two-hundred seventeen

individual and corporate volunteers were involved in the endeavor to build GSHFH's 67th home in Springfield. Many came from Restoration City Church, Liberty Bank, MassMutual, MGM Springfield, Positive Regard Network/Springdale Education Center, Appleton Corp., Commonwealth Care Alliance, Liberty Mutual, OMG, M&T Bank, Second Baptist Church of South Hadley, and Westfield State University, among others.

"I had the opportunity to come down here with my Chief of Staff, Robin, and spend a few hours helping with work. It does really

make you feel good when you know you're not only giving back to the community, but also giving back to the family that needs and cares so much about this project," said State Rep Brian Ashe (D-2nd District Hampden). "Habitat for

Family friend Mary Johnson spoke about the early days when Driss,

Majda, and their two girls lived with her family. She spoke of their friendship, when Majda helped Mary with her Arabic, and taught songs in Arabic that Mary said she still sings with her own children.

"Majda taught me what it looks like to love your friends, to really love them," said Mary. "This is a truly beautiful neighborhood here. It already has so many wonderful neighbors, homes, and families. Now that Majda and Driss are here too, I know they'll fit right in. They'll bring their kindness, the Moroccan hospitality, and love to everyone they meet."

Driss and Majda closed on their home in mid-June.

Home Preservation Projects

Home Preservation projects help homeowners maintain safe, healthy, and stable housing by addressing critical repairs and accessibility needs. These projects often include repairs such as roofing, plumbing, heating, electrical work, and safety modifications like ramps or grab bars. By preserving existing homes, Home Preservation programs allow families—especially seniors, veterans, and low-income homeowners—to remain in their homes, protect their investment, and strengthen the stability of the community.

A unique project brings community together, makes homeownership affordable for local couple

Greater Springfield Habitat for Humanity (GSHFH), Holyoke Housing Authority (HHA), and the University of Massachusetts DesignBuild program have partnered to make one local couple's dream of affordable homeownership come true.

In a unique collaboration, HHA has donated a plot of land on Chestnut Street. Greater Springfield Habitat prepared the site and build the foundation. UMass DesignBuild professors and students created and constructed a modular home, and oversaw delivery to the Holyoke site. GSHFH will then finish the inside work and sell the new home to Pedro and his wife Damaris, longtime Holyoke residents.

"This project is a learning experience for all of us and I hope we can do more projects like this in the future," said Olga Callirgos, GSHFH Homeowner Services manager.

Home design began in spring 2025. Construction commenced in summer. The house was delivered in November.

The design emphasizes energy efficiency via highly-insulated and air-sealed exterior assemblies, triple-glazed windows, all-electric appliances/utilities, and low-embodied carbon building materials, such as wood fiber, hemp, and straw, said Ben Leinfelder, construction manager of UMass Building and Construction Technology.

While some may view the house as "tiny," the UMass DesignBuild team prefers to call it "modest." It will encompass the comfort and convenience of a larger home, but with a more compact and manageable footprint. The one-bedroom home will have full-sized appliances and fixtures

in the kitchen and bathroom, and plenty of storage throughout the home.

"It's the perfect size for a couple or single person who wants the lifestyle and private outdoor space of a single-family home without the heating bill and added maintenance of a larger, older house," said Naomi Darling, design studio professor at Mount Holyoke College and UMass Architecture. "This is exactly the scale of home that is missing in our housing market and for which there is an increasing demand."

Families applying for the homeownership opportunity had to be clients of the HHA's self-sufficiency program; earn between 35% and 60% of the area median income for Hampden County; have a positive credit history showing timely payments; a debt-to-income ratio of less than 43%; and the ability to pay 29% of their household income toward a mortgage.

Additionally, future homeowners are required to perform sweat equity, which is their hands-on investment. To keep costs affordable, selected Habitat families work alongside volunteers on the construction of their home, participate in office

activities, or at events.

Pedro, who is retired, attended every info session, and submitted the necessary forms two days after the application cycle opened. He and his wife currently live in a one-bedroom apartment and have complained about their unfriendly neighbors who they say makes their everyday life unenjoyable.

When Pedro and Damaris received the news of their acceptance into the project, Pedro said he was quite surprised. "I didn't think they had picked anyone yet and HHA said I was just coming for an info session. This is such a dream. We were very surprised," said Vivian Rodriguez, HHA Homeownership Education coordinator and interpreter for the couple.


